PART A: Executive Summary – The SWOC analysis of the Institute.

Nandha Arts and Science College, a self-financing college affiliated to Bharathiar University, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu is located on the corridor of state highway between Erode-Coimbatore near Perundurai, Tamil Nadu. Nandha Arts and Science College, Erode was established in 2000 by Sri Nandha Educational Trust is yet another milestone in the Trust's march to attain excellence in the field of higher education. It can be rightly said that it is build on the fruitful experience of an excellent past to guarantee a promising future. The college is affiliated to Bharathiar University, Coimbatore and also its examination centre for its School of Distance Education in this part of Erode District. The main aim of the college is to provide value-based technical education and mould the character of younger generation and to be a world class Engineering institution in leading technological and socio-economic development of the country by enhancing the global competitiveness of technical manpower and by ensuring high quality education, dissemination of knowledge, insights and intellectual contributions.

The College started with four branches of undergraduate courses twelve years ago, and has grown to a multidisciplinary institution with eleven UG courses, four PG Courses, four M.Phil programmes and two Ph.D programmes. Importantly, with the direction from the well-known educationalist Dr.S.P.Viswanathan, Former Registrar, Bharathiar University guided in the growth of the College, has been well planned to excel and aimed to meet the specific needs of our industry and the growing academic interests of the student community.

The strategic planning to improve the quality of education, Research & Development and Innovation using various objectives is based on the Strength Weakness Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) Analysis. The SWOC analysis was performed in a population of all the stakeholders such as students, parents, teachers, personnel in the administration and human resource personnel from the industries. These analysis highlighted similar attributes as the strengths in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular areas in the undergraduate educational system of the College. Specifically, the attributes like 80-90% graduation rate with approximately 40% having distinction, more than 90% placement for all the eligible graduating students and more than 50% students, who have opted to go for higher education programme and also enroll in foreign universities reflect the existence of a high-quality undergraduate programme in our college.

These are the unique selling points of the College, also. These characteristics of this College have aligned with the mission of the College, which states "Offering excellent education to men and women at undergraduate and post-graduate levels".

SWOC ANALYSIS

The SWOC matrix was defined with certain parameters. The following are the Key findings from the SWOC analysis on Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges.

STRENGTHS GENERAL:

- 1. The College, which is 12 years old, has secured a good image in the public. It is the most sought private Arts and Science College in this region, by the students and parents.
- 2. The college is situated in a spacious 10.99 acres campus, on the State highway between Erode to Coimbatore.
- 3. Mr.V.Shanmugan, a renowned educationalist and well known person, is the chairman of our Institution.
- 4. The institution has got excellent infrastructure for graduate and undergraduate programmes.
- 5. The college has 21 Mbps internet connectivity and a professionally designed website www.nandhaarts.org.

ACADEMICS:

- 1. More than 85% of students graduate every year, on a consistent basis.
- 2. Our students consistently secure University ranks (about 10 students on an average, every year are placed in the top 10 University ranks).
- 3. Additional topics, beyond syllabus are covered by the teachers.
- 4. College works for 5 days in a week, in a staggered manner, so that the students and faculty get an extra day for special coaching, research and other professional development activities.
- 5. The college recognizes and appreciates top academic performers in each class in the internal evaluation and University examinations.
- 6. The college has set up five smart classrooms and is in the process of converting every class room to a smart class room.

FACULTY MEMBERS:

- 1. The faculty members are an ideal blend of youth and experience, 5% of faculty members are Ph.D. holders and 40% of the faculty members are registered for Ph.D. All are highly motivated.

- 3. Responsibilities and authorities are delegated to H.O.Ds and Deans, which have resulted in a transparent management.

RESEARCH:

- 1. College sponsors faculty for Ph.D and Research.
- 2. College sponsors faculty and students for presenting research papers in international conferences.
- 3. Incentives and rewards are given for research paper publications in national and international journals.
- 4. Almost all eligible departments have been recognized as Research Centres by Bharathiar University, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu.
- 5. Many members of our faculty have been recognized as the Ph.D / M.Phil research guides by Various Universities.

ACCREDITATION:

11 UG and 4 PG courses have been given permanent affiliation by the Bharathiar University.

STUDENT CENTRIC:

- 1. Five percent of tuition income is distributed as scholarships / tuition fee waiver to students.
- 2. Corpus fund is used for providing assistance to students for purchasing books and instruments.
- 3. Personality and professional development of students are given importance in the students' Evaluation processes.
- 4. Students are good at organizational capabilities.
- 5. Students are actively counseled by the faculty advisors. One faculty advisor / Tutor is nominated for every class.
- 6. Students give feedback on teachers.
- 7. Hostel facility to accommodate 100 men and 100 women students is available.
- 8. Excellent placement record More than 90% of eligible undergraduate students got placed every year in leading companies.
- 9. More than 50% of eligible students pursue higher education in India and Overseas.
- 10. Presence of a strong alumni base alumni supports the college by way of giving scholarships, guiding the students, Industry Institute Interaction, etc.
- 11. The teachers through Placement cell conduct special coaching classes at the language laboratory to improve the soft skills and employability of students.
- 12. Parents meet are organized once in a semester to take their feedback and take corrective actions.
- 13. Twenty-four hour's medical care is available in the College.
- 14. The college houses a indoor sports complex having gymnasium, TT, Basket ball etc.,

- 3. Communication skill of $\approx 15\%$ students needs to be improved.
- 4. Library to be expanded to cater to growing research needs.
- 5. The College is affiliated to the Bharathiar University and hence has limitation in upgrading by curriculum.
- 6. Consultancy and extension activities need improvement.
- 7. No technology incubators to transfer the technology to industries.

OPPORTUNITIES

- 1. Situated near Perundurai, where SEZ helped in vigorous growth of the region. Also, the area is a hub for the automobile, Textiles and other industries.
- 2. The technology is developing at a rapid rate. Nanotechnology and Cloud computing are the recent technological advances to name a few.
- 3. The students have become more demanding. The students have a large potential, which can be honed.
- 4. The interdisciplinary research in niche areas is the need of the day, which gives opportunity in all areas.
- 5. As the faculty members are being paid a higher pay as per the 6th pay commission, faculty retention is better.
- 6. Student exchange programmes with premier institutions in India and Foreign Universities are possible.

CHALLENGES

- 1. Changing Social and economical scenario leading to unpredictable future.
- 2. Coping with rapid changing in technology and the industrial requirements to improve the employability of the students are the biggest challenge for an Institution affiliated to a University.
- 3. Declining supply of quality faculty, doctorates as well as exposing the teaching faculty to the Industrial scenario and get them trained in an industry is another challenge.





<u>Choice based Credit System:</u> The CBCS was introduced by the affiliating University from 2004 onwards. All the UG and PG programmes of the institution come under CBCS pattern. Course offered in Modular Form: The syllabi for all the programmes are unitized.

<u>Credit Transfer and Accumulation Facility</u>: There is no provision for credit transfer and accumulation facility. Yes, to review the admission process an admission committee is formed every year and the committee strictly follows the rules laid down by both the University and the government of Tamil Nadu to ensure transparency in the admission procedure. Duly filled in application forms are sorted, indexed on the basis of norms supplied by the Bharathiar University, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu. The Admission Committee for Under Graduate programme scrutinizes the application & finalizes the admissions.

And to review the student profiles, every department maintained student profile for each class. This profile is prepared in two ways, one is handwritten note for each classes and another as softcopy in college automation record. Student profiles include all the details such as parent name, home address, extra-curricular activities, prizes obtained, semester mark statement and others.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate / reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion SC/ST, OBC, Women, Differently abled, Economically weaker sections, Minority community, Any other.

The college adheres to the reservation policy laid down by the government to provide admission to students from disadvantaged sections of the society. 50% of the seats on General Merit, 15% seats reserved for SC, 7.5% for ST, 15% for OBC and 12.5% seats for women. Sportspersons, Physically challenged persons and sections of linguistic minority also get their due share in admission. The college reserves five seat each in the UG and PG programs for students with outstanding records in sports and games.

The college has good infrastructure and a well maintained campus. It has two streams (Arts and Science) at U.G., P.G., M.Phil and Ph.D level with highly qualified staff. Regular Classes are held in the college along with extracurricular activities.

2.2 CATERING TO DIVERSE NEEDS OF STUDENTS

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Differently-abled students are provided with scholarships as per the Government rules. They are provided with facilities in the college as per govt. norms and the university guidelines:

- 1. Ramp facilities were provided for Lab and Library.
- 2. Separate seat arrangement during class, lab and library hour.
- 3. Three wheelchairs are arranged.
- 4. Special arrangement for writing exams.

Yes, 15 days bridge courses were conducted every year before the commencement of the course. Tally for commerce students, Basic computer, Spoken English, Communication skills, Yoga and First aid programmed were conducted as bridge courses. After the commencement of classes, the tutors concerned will have interactive sessions with the students to identify their knowledge and skills as well as their drawbacks in academic and extracurricular activities and will give due attention and guidance to improve them.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programmed of their choice? (Bridge / Remedial / Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc.

The following strategies are adopted to facilitate slow learners.

- 1. Make learning fun and comfortable. Provide meaningful, concrete activities rather than abstract.
- 2. Tutorial and remedial classes for slow learners and advance assignments for gifted learners
- 3. Parents of slow learners invited to discuss the progress with their wards.
- Courses like Communication Skill, Personality Development, Computer training, Yoga and Human Rights are already running in the college.

- 5. Many guest lectures are arranged so that students can gain extra knowledge.
- 6. Weakly test are conducted
- 7. Evening classes were conducted.
- 8. Group discussion is encouraged among the students.
- 9. Re-test is conducted.
- 10. Guidance and Counseling is must for the slow learner.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

We conduct workshops, seminars, conferences, contest on various topics and the college has constituted Women's Cell with Ms.P.Ramya as its chairperson to sensitive gender issues and issues of environment etc. Copies of the reports are sent to the University.

We also have Anti Ragging cell and Grievance Redressal cell. Suggestion box were fixed in the entire block.

The Academic Monitoring Committee in consultation with the concerned Subject teacher prepares list of students of differently abled and weaker section students whose performance is not satisfactory and who are at the risk of drop out. Such students are motivated by the counselors, motivational sessions by the experts organized.

Awareness and counseling regarding right to education for women are passed to the society.

Physically challenged students are provided with scholarships as per the Government rules. Other facilities and comfortable environment were provided.

Parents of slow learners invited to discuss the progress with their wards. Courses like Communication Skill, Personality Development, Computer training, Yoga and Human Rights are already running in the college. Many guest lectures are arranged so that students can gain extra knowledge. Weakly test, Evening classes and Re-test were conducted. Guidance and Counseling is must for the slow learner.

For economically weak students, fees concession are provided.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

- 1. Academic calendar: Nandha Arts and Science College is affiliated to Bharathiar University and has to adhere to the academic calendar published by the University. Academic calendar is provided to the entire student on the college opening day. The calendar include all the information regarding college reopening, internal exam schedule, seminar schedule, University exam date, extension activities, enrichment programme and others.
- 2. Teaching plan: The entire faculty member maintained their own teaching plan and teaching material.
- **3. Evaluation blueprint:** University syllabus, Examination answer keys and mark list blueprint was prepared by faculty member.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching – learning process?

IQAC has been established in the college. The focus of this plan is to ensure the improvement in the entire college by making new innovative techniques and providing knowledge in different ways. In order to prepare them to face national and global challenges such as national and international seminar in other college. Faculty development programme, Orientation and Enrichment programmes are organized for the faculty member.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and Systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college has student centered pedagogy with the active participation of UG, PG, M.Phil and Ph.D students like class seminars, department seminars, paper presentation, project works, field trip, group discussions and innovative science exhibition.

Through project writing, presentation and case studies students are encouraged to participate in state level, national level and international level seminars, workshops and other competitive events. Students are also encouraged to read articles / research papers/journal/competitive success and many other current affairs magazine and present them in classroom. Students are sent to nearby industries to enhance their innovative skills.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Use of modern teaching aids and tools like computers, audio-visuals multi-media, ICT, CAL, Internet, Del Net and other information /materials is encouraged by the college authorities.

Computer assisted learning has been introduced in some departments. Facilities such as LCD Projector, OHP, Computer and the Internet are being used for teaching and tutorial.

To keep abreast of the new developments in the respective areas of specialization, teachers & PG students and researchers are encouraged to attend seminars / workshops / conferences to attend refresher / orientation courses organized by other universities and institutions of the country (Details are given in the Department profile). Different seminar, symposium were conducted to enrich their knowledge's in other college "MOU".

Reports are provided by Career Guidance Cell and Academic Monitoring Committee to the Principal periodically. These reports are discussed item-wise in the fortnightly meetings with the Principal and on month-end with the Management.

Each department has a system for the evaluation of teachers by students, through a feedback mechanism. This is carried out at the end of the course in UG level and at the end of second and fourth semesters in PG level. Based on the report from such feedbacks, appropriate action will be initiated by the principal to improve the quality of teaching. A report is prepared based on the feedback of the students on curriculum, course contents and other aspects of teaching-learning and appropriate action is taken to improve the quality of the academic programme.

The library is enriched with recent books, journals, magazines, encyclopedia and reference books. Library is used by the teacher & students apart from reading in the reading room. There is a general library which caters to the needs in general of the students and the

staff. Library is open to all students and members of staff of the college. Separate department library also maintained with their respected subjects and project records.

All the student and faculty member are encouraged to use the library. Separate library hours are provided for all the classes. Free hour are use as library hour for faculty members. News reading is made mandatory for the students. Best library uses award was given to particular student or staff member.

No challenges have been face yet. The entire curriculum is completed in planned time frame and calendar.

Many competitions are held annually in every department to assess the students overall progress like - poster making, essay competition, debate, general knowledge, paper presentation competition etc. Internal assessment is done at U.G and P.G. level and sent to the university.

The recruitment procedure as prescribed by UGC is scrupulously followed; also financial incentives are given for every additional qualification which has a bearing on the teaching and learning. Sabbatical leave provisions are also available to quiche their academic thirst. Teachers who are in service are given orientation and a specified minimum number of refresher courses in order to upkeep with that of the current developments in their domain. Certain financial and non-financial incentives are strategically provided for achievers and qualifiers in order to retain the talents. An attractive starting scale ensures required number of applications and a true selection takes place in order to fit the right HR to the right position.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand / scarcity of qualified senior faculty members to teach new programmes / modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.,)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The principal appoints guest lecturers as per the guidelines of the government and U.G.C. to handle new programmes where permanent posts are not sanctioned by the Government. Less than 5% of the total faculty strength was appointed as guest faculty during the last three years. The staffs are allowed to participate in various seminars and the colleges organize guest lectures on specific title to enrich the staffs in new topics. The college encourages the faculty members to attend orientation and refresher courses and other training programmes that would improve their teaching and knowledge. The college does not keep away from the emerging areas or disciplines; instead, the faculty members are encouraged and supported to attain knowledge of new areas through orientation and refresher courses and other training programmes.

The management provides all kinds of support to the teachers who are proposing to do research or publish a research papers. There is a provision for granting study leave and providing seed money to such teachers. The management encourages the faculty members to present papers and participated in various seminars and workshops by providing financial support. Teachers are supported to receive research grants from UGC and other academic bodies. 44 of our teachers are engaged in doctoral research. The principal and six teachers have already received doctoral degrees. Two of our faculties has submitted his thesis and is awaiting the award. The college facilitates research activities and encourages teachers to attend and present papers in seminars and conferences. Most of our faculty members have published works in reputed journals.

Yes, there is a feedback form to be filled by the students and the suggestions are used by Academic Monitoring Committee in consultation with principal to suggest various ways of improvement. The institution collects feedback from the students at the end of each semester through specially designed questionnaire, and the data thus received is reviewed by the faculty members concerned and required alterations in teaching strategies and methods are done for the semesters to come. The procedure facilitates better transaction of learning materials in and out of the classroom and creates better academic ambience.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

Students and other institutional members are given general instructions regarding the evaluation methods. The periodic instructions issued by the university are promptly communicated to the students. Such instructions are read in the classrooms and the copy of the same is displayed on the students' notice board. The tutors are entrusted with the duty of providing awareness among the students regarding this. Students are informed through messages to their cell phone regarding absentees, internal marks, leave etc.,

The evaluation methods are informed to the students well in advance before the university examinations. The previous university examination question papers and model papers are made available to the students in the department library. The students are informed of class tests and assignments and their scores are displayed on the notice boards of the respective departments. Students are also informed of the schemes of evaluation, updates on curriculum revision, alterations in the question patterns and do's and don'ts during practical examinations.

The university provides scheme of examination and changes in the evaluation strategies every academic year in selected centers, and the information collected from there are disseminated to the faculty members and students. Model examinations are conducted before the university semester examinations to prepare students to face the examinations with confidence.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Setting of question papers, valuation of answer books and publication of results are carried out by the University. University is the sole authority for the implementation of reforms in examination and evaluation. Individual colleges do not have a direct role in this regard. However, faculty members who are part of the academic bodies of the University actively campaign for reforms in evaluation. The Continuous evaluation system for the P.G courses of the institution has been evaluated in this manner. The institution has adopted these reforms and follows the system meticulously. The university has also introduced the system of Continuous Evaluation where the faculty members evaluate and assess the students on the basis of his/her performance throughout the semester. The process of tabulation of marks is computerized, and displayed on the notice board of the respective departments. Complaints, if any are examined by the Students' Grievance Redressal Cell and recommendations are made to the departments concerned for rectification if required before forwarding it to the university.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Setting of question papers, valuation of answer books and publication of results are carried out by the University. University is the sole authority for the implementation of reforms in examination and evaluation. Our college does not have a direct role in this regard. However, faculty members who are part of the academic bodies of the University actively campaign for reforms in evaluation. The Continuous evaluation system for the P.G courses of the institution has been affected in this manner. Being an affiliated college; it follows the rules prescribed by the University in connection with the implementation of CBCS programme. The evaluation reforms are implemented promptly and as part of it the faculty members continuously evaluate the performance of students in each semester.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

According to their performance the counseling's are made to the parents by the teachers. During the last few Years this method has proved extremely useful as 37 out of 40 students could get first class in B.Sc. Examination. Each department conducts unit tests, assignments, seminar presentations and viva voce as part of the formative evaluation of the CBCS programme in the college. As a result of this formative evaluation, the students can face the examinations without fright and can gather thorough understanding of the subject. As for the practical examinations, sufficient exposure to the examination is provided by the departments concerned and it is helpful to the students to perform well during the university examinations. At the end of each semester, model examinations are conducted to formulate a summative evaluation, and based on the results, students take necessary corrective steps in the preparation for the university examination.

As all the students attend these examinations compulsorily, they receive proper feedback from the teachers on their performance.

The students are evaluated by weekly exams, monthly exams and model exams.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course / programme? Provide an analysis of the students results / achievements (Programme / course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes / courses offered.

For monthly exams, the parents of the students are invited to share our views and suggest remedies. The students are provided counseling and their weak points are brought to their notice and thus proper development of the students in terms of their course programme and overall performance is ensured. The details of the students result are available with the examination cell of the college.

2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The students are required to undergo a test for 75 marks for Internals. Efforts are made to ensure that timely and original submissions are made by the students and students are requested to make PPT presentations in their own style, group discussion, assignments and to ensure overall development of the students. The marks given to each student is modified by the concerned Head of the Department. University guidelines in this respect are strictly adhered too. The departments conduct internal assessment and provide 20% of the total credits assigned for a course on the basis of attendance, class tests, assignments and seminars. The better of the two grades of the class tests, performance in the seminar presentations and assignments and the percentage of attendance are considered for internal grades. Assignments are given well in advance in each semester and the timely submission is ensured by the departments. Internal grades are displayed on the notice boards to assure transparency and correctness before they are forwarded to the university. The behavioral traits, independent learning and communication skill of students are reflected in their presentations, viva voce, regular attendance and timely submission of assignments. The heads of the departments hand over Attendance and Progress Certificate of the students to the administrative section in charge of examinations. Only those students who secure 75% of attendance are eligible to appear for university examinations.

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment / evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, the IQAC of the College evaluates and monitors students' performances in the college. In this regard students are advised to prepare assignment, PPT, Seminars, group discussions and extracurricular activities; based on each performance the students are evaluated . University guidelines in this respect are strictly adhered too. The assignments, seminar presentations and test papers are considered as indicators of student performance.

The timely submission of assignments, attendance, scores achieved in the test papers and seminars are also considered for the award of grades. Grades are minimized for incorrect data presented late submission of assignments and absence in the class tests. Based on the achievement of the students in particular courses, alterations are introduced in the teaching strategies.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Students are free to submit their complaints, if any, to the Grievances Redressal Cell, ccnsisting of Heads of Departments and senior faculty members. If their complaints are not dealt with desire in the Cell, they can appeal to the Principal. Further justice, if needed, can be had from the University level committee. The college has a Student Grievance Redressal Cell which considers complaints of students regarding the internal grades awarded by the departments. The cell is constituted from among the senior teachers and heads of the departments. The university also has formed a Student Grievances Cell which considers matters regarding both internal grades as well as the grades at the end of each semester examinations conducted by the university. It offers an opportunity to the students to get their answer scripts re-evaluated within a stipulated time.

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the students have made some innovative contributions in terms of their projects and other small reports through science exhibition as per the instruction of the college designing examples by the college. In this the students expose their innovative skill, they are honored by prices. "Learn, serve and succeed" is the motto of the college, and to materialize this motto, the college aims to orient the young students towards academic excellence, personality development and social commitment.

The curriculum and the syllabi of the academic programmes offered in this college are transacted in such a way that these objectives are realized by the successful completion of the programmes.

Self-reliance and skills in communication, coordination, planning, management, academic writing, and presentation are to be acquired by the students through these programmes. These learning outcomes are communicated to the students' right from the beginning of the academic programmes during the induction ceremony and orientation sessions.

2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The availability of ICT in college and other Audio-Visual Aids are made accessible to the students which facilitate them in their intended projects. The institution promotes student centric learning through assignments, projects, seminars, project works and practical sessions, which help the students to acquire and develop skill in collecting, processing and presenting relevant data, and also develop skills in communication, co-ordination, planning, management and academic writing. As part of teaching-learning strategy, the institution provides the students with free internet access, INFLIBNET facility, EDUSAT, and these facilities help the students to collect up-to-date information for learning. The institution encourages field visits, industrial visits and interaction with experts through seminars and workshops, by which the students develop their knowledge, personality and social orientation.

2.6.3 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The institution has planned quality development like Soft-skills, technical expertise and knowledge content among the students for placing them at better jobs. In this venture of the Institution, the Insproplus have come forward to the help of the Institution. All the programmes offered in this institution equip the students to undertake quality jobs and materialize their career ambitions. The college prepares and distributes booklets containing information on recruitment processes, higher education institutions, interview techniques, group discussion strategies and quality jobs. The college hosts campus interviews, career and higher education seminars. All the eligible students of the institution have registered with Tamil Nadu Public Service Commission (one time registration). The college periodically displays PSC/UPSC and other job notifications so that students can apply for them in time.

Training and Placement Cell are functioning in the campus to enhance the career opportunity and skills of the students. Students are provided with career magazines which enable them to cope with the current trends in the job market. We take students to visit leading R & D institutions to ignite scholastic aptitude among them. The active participation of students in national seminars is encouraged to develop their research aptitude. Entrepreneurial Development Cell under the guidance of the Department of Commerce gives entrepreneurial guidance to the students.

2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The suggestions and ideas of the students forwarded through their projects and research reports are analyzed to frame future policies in the interest of the students. One of the barriers that were detected through this report of the students was their communication difficulties. Therefore, the institution has decided to set up a Language Lab and students are encouraged to read English newspapers, to take part in plays, and group discussion to improving their communication skills. The institution collects data on student learning on the basis of the result obtained in the semester examinations, and also from the higher education enrolment ratio from each programme.

The college also collects feedbacks from institutions and industries with regard to the performance of our students. The college offers academic guidance to those students who failed in the recent exams and also to successfully complete their programmes to reappear and clear the examinations. We offer special coaching to the weak students through the respective departments.

2.6.5 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The students have made some innovative contributions in terms of their projects and other small reports through science exhibition designing examples by the college. In this the students expose their innovative areas and they are honored by prices. Continuous evaluation under CBCS is useful in ensuring the achievement of learning outcomes of our students. Grades are given on the basis of the achievement of the required skills and abilities. Besides, the exposure provided to the students through various curricular and co-curricular activities on a regular basis ensure that the learning outcomes are achieved in the course of the programme. The results obtained in the semester examinations, higher education enrolment ratio and feedback from industries all point towards the achievement of the learning outcome of our students.

Graduates of the College/ University are provided, in different course contexts, with the opportunity to develop the following specific attributes that are consistent with the broad graduate objective determined by the University Council. They are expected to have a strong understanding of the basics of the discipline undertaken by the time they complete the programme. Self-reliance and skills in communication, coordination, planning, management, academic writing and presentation skills are also expected in the students so that they can undertake any career that demands these skills. All the activities of the departments and the college are designed with this aim in perspective.

Our campers have worked in those villages and planted trees, dug soak pits, built water conservation barricades and roads. The NSS units have succeeded in creating new awareness as regards agriculture, health, superstitions and education. Through special camp of 05-07 days, the students had changed the village lifestyle by cutting the useless shrubs on the road and by building new roads. A rally was

organized under the awareness programme against women harassment, traffic problems, tobacco eradication, AIDS, water management, etc.

b) Cultural programmes:

Every year our college celebrates a cultural programme called "HILARIO", in which more than 60 Colleges have participated in state level competition. Literary club "AZHAIGAL" and "Talentia" an intra-college cultural competition provide all students an opportunity to exhibit their talents..

Higher Education is a key to fulfilling our intensive and extensive knowledge requirements for research and development. Infrastructure (especially technological infrastructure in present knowledge era) plays a great role (as a tool) to achieve excellence in teaching and research. For purposes of curriculum and examination, our college is affiliated to **Bharathiar University, Coimbatore**, which therefore decides the syllabus and the academic calendar. However at the institution level, it is our constant endeavor to do as much as we can for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning. The present set-up is commensurate with our requirements.

(a) Academic activities

Our College has spacious seminar / conference halls equipped with LCD projectors and computers, adequate number of classrooms and well equipped laboratories. The college has an advanced molecular biology laboratory. The chambers for the faculties and discussion room to facilitate the academic programs. The College has a separate block for administration. The Central Library, with adequate space, ample number of BOOKS, JOURNALS, INTERNET, INFLIBNET, DELNET and other facilities, are located at the central place. The College has an out-door Sports Ground for sports activities and a Health Center to meet the diagnostic and medical treatment of students and staff. The College has five furnished equipped Computer labs. The infrastructure involves spacious class rooms, proper lighting and ventilation, seating arrangement with proper visibility for both students and lecturers. There is facility of common rest room for boys and girls separately. Special arrangements for canteen for the students and the staff, provision of staff-room and the auditorium is also there. The college has hostel facility for both boys and girls separately. The College has a large cafeteria to serve food and refreshments to staff, students and guests.

- e) Time Management

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty employment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institution encourages faulty members by conducting various programmes like, women's development cell, cultural activities, sports activities, conferences, workshop, and seminars for staff members of national professional bodies. We have to follow the rules of U.G.C. norms of service. For career advancement and training we sent our teaching staff for Orientation Programme and Refresher Courses for their retraining.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The performance based self-appraisal system captures all activities and it is based on the UGC model. Most of the teaching staff members will give above 75 of result in every semester. The institution takes action with the concern staff members in case of less than 75% of result given by them. The institution provides training for the staff members and they may make necessary changes in their performance on the top level. In addition with principal selected faculty and students are frequently met by the chair man in person to know the

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activities. At the end of every year our Director receives the Confidential Reports of all teachers through the Principal. In the Report Principal evaluates the performance of staff and gives the grading according to the work performed.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The outcome of the review of the performance based self-appraisals is disclosed to every staff in a staff meeting. Based on the recommendations of the external experts cash incentives are provided to the staff. Common lacuna, if any, in the appraisal of all the staff becomes the sprouting point of policy intervention. The trustees are communicated about the common lacuna and necessary corrective steps to reinforce the common weaknesses are taken.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The mandatory welfare schemes such as contributory provident fund, medical insurance, employee health benefit are benefiting all the staff members. Preferential admission to wards of staff, considering wards of deceased employees for appointment are also in vogue and there are beneficiaries in the past.

Being a Self financing institution, large pool of young applicants is attracted. The institution is issuing open-advertisements in leading dailies to supplement the recruitment process. Initial attractive salary and enriching job environment draws good number of

applications in the recruitment process. Performance-based incentive system helps in the retention of meritorious teachers.

The congenial atmosphere, research-savvy environment and caring Management have made most of the appointed teachers to stay on till their retirement.

The management has Academic and administrative committee, in which administrative committee has a panel of financial experts to ensure and monitor effective utilization of available financial resources efficiently. The management has already been computerized in the whole institution through LAN. This could helps to prepare the MIS report and ensures the available fund and other day to day financial admin activities.

The Institution use to conduct audit through internal and external as per the Indian government and UGC norms. The last audit was done during the financial year 2012 - 2013.

Since, we got status change certificate from UGC, we approaching a different UGC Grant applicable to self financing colleges.

The Institution belongs to permanently unaided category; there is no any external funding. The major source of fund generation to the Institution is only through students' fee. 7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, our institute conducts Green Audit twice a year. Environment awareness program is conducted once in every six months as part of which rally is done and pamphlets are issued. Our NSS units, has adopted nearby villages, where tree plantation is done. Also trees are issued to every student when they complete their graduation.

Eco club has conducted awareness about various diseases and their preventive measures among the students and faculty members. Medicinal plants are grown within the college premises. Dustbins have been placed in every class room and everywhere inside the campus as part of eco club. The institution is now transformed into a paperless organization. All the circulars are sent through mail to minimize the exploitation of natural resources. Campus cleaning is done by the students of this club. Use of plastic is prohibited inside the campus. Plastic tumblers and plates are replaced by paper cups and plates in the canteen.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the college eco-friendly? Energy conservation

- Solar power panel is placed in which solar energy is converted into electrical energy.
- There are stabilizers in the laboratory which ensures the regular supply of electricity to the machineries.
- All the members of the institution are conscious about the economic usage of electricity. Awareness is created among the students to minimize the electricity consumption by switching oof the lights and fans while coming out of the class rooms.
- As the classes are well ventilated and natural sunlight is ample, the consumption of electricity is reduced.
- In addition to this, an automatic tripper is placed in each block, which hinders the passage of electricity when not in use. Water recycling plant is installed and the recycled water is used for the plants and trees

Use of renewable energy

- For the disposal of waste in the college 'compost' technique is adopted. All the waste is filled in a pit and after a period of few months, it is used as manure for the plants.
- Our institution is planning to construct a biogas plant from which energy can be produced and utilized.
- Solar power panel is placed in the ground from which solar energy is converted into electrical energy.

Water harvesting

- > Rain water harvesting project is already functioning in the college.
- > Rain water from each block are passed through pipes which leads into the earth.
- Apart from this, waste water outside the building is united in one common place and fed into a small well.

Efforts for carbon neutrality

- The teachers and students of N.S.S Unit visit nearby industries to create awareness about reduced carbon emission.
- > Many trees are planted in and around the city to reduce the pollution.

Plantation

- Tree plantation is done inside and outside the campus by the students of the institution.
- > Our NSS units has adopted nearby villages, where tree plantation is done.
- The college issue trees to every student when they complete their graduation and insist them to plant it in their home.
- > Every year around thousand trees are planted by Eco-Club of our college.

Hazardous waste management

- > The college emits no hazardous waste.
- The students are aware of hazardous waste from various industries like chemical, plastics, electronic, textile and starch factories.
- The students and teachers of the college visit the nearby textile industries to make them aware of hazardous textile effluent and measures to treat the effluent. Number of lectures has been organized in the college on hazardous waste management.

E-waste management

- E-waste management is done by returning the older damaged batteries to the authorized distributor/vendor.
- Other electronic wastages are surrendered to the Corporation which is destroyed safely by them.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

- ✓ Every month, a feedback form is issued to the students regarding infrastructure and academic facilities, which is then scrutinized and action is taken.
- ✓ ASTRA is conducted by the college in which various courses have been conducted through which both public and students are benefitted.
- \checkmark Our NSS units has adopted nearby villages to improve their health and hygiene facilities.
- ✓ Innovation day, a 3 day science exhibition is conducted every year to bring out the technical skills of the students.
- ✓ Anti-ragging committee is formed by the faculty members to prevent any unpleasant happenings.
- \checkmark The college has five well equipped air conditioned computer lab each with sixty computers.
- ✓ The college has a communication laboratory with special software to improve the student's language fluency.
- ✓ Bank examination coaching was made it as a compulsory to the PG students of our college and for UG students its optional.

- ✓ NET, SET coaching is compulsory for PG students, our faculty members and outside members during weekends.
- ✓ To inculcate the Tamil culture and tradition among the students "Pongal Thiruvila" have been organized every year during Pongal festival.
- ✓ "Radiance" function has organized every year, to exhibit the students' business skills.
- ✓ "Hilario" A state level inter-collegiate cultural meet organized every year in the college campus to exhibit the students' artistic talents.
- ✓ "Talentia" An intra college talent festival conducted every year to find out the hidden talents of the students and train them to participate in university, State and National level competitions.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

1. DISTRIBUTION OF MERIT PRIZES TO STUDENTS

GOAL: To inspire a competitive mentality and to motivate the students to secure more marks than his/her peers in the vicinity in the University Examinations. This will indirectly motivate the students to get University Ranks in the Examinations.

OPERATION: Immediately after the publication of the University Examination results, a list of students who have secured 75% and more marks is drawn as eligible candidates for this scheme (25% Fee Concession). A list of students have selected for this scheme has been announced in a grand ceremony. College organizes graduation day every year with eminent academicians such as vice-chancellors for the distribution of Degree Certificates in the presence of parents. In that function, University Rank holders are also felicitated and Certificate of Merit is also issued to the students.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: Merit prize scheme was started in the year 2004. The beneficiaries of the scheme are in the increasing trend in every semester as shown in the following table.

2. GUEST LECTURES AND WORKSHOPS

Guest lectures and workshops are conducted by all the departments to enrich the students' knowledge.

GOAL: To equip the students with the current and practical knowledge; to enhance the presentation skill of the students.

THE OPERATION: Every department is mandated to organize three guest lectures and workshops in each semester by drawing eminent academicians/industry experts as resource persons. These programmes are planned in advance so as to optimize the resources without duplication and benefitting the most. All these activities are week-end activities without disturbing regular academic schedule.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: The feedbacks received from the students encourage the continuance of the scheme. Earnestly it is expected that the employability and industry-readiness will increase.

PROBLEM ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:

- Ensuring 100% presence poses problems since it is a week-end programme.
- Since almost all the students are from the village background, studied in tamil medium and also in Government schools, their English language skill is very poor. So it is very difficult for them to pick up the language skill even though tremendous efforts has been taken.

Format for Presentation of Practice

1. Title of the Practice

Providing value based education particularly to the unprivileged section of the men and women inhabiting rural areas in the vicinity.

2. Goal

The goal of the Institution is to provide value based education system. Hence in addition to the regular academic schedule, emphasis is given to the development of critical ability, work ethics and personality building. This is expected to help the individual to adjust to the socioeconomic and cultural environment. Such enrichment is sought through motivating the academic and non-academic staff and the students, thus the aim of providing a conducive environment and excellent infrastructure is achieved. Besides, our college is very keen to offer vocational and extension programmes, so that the students get a relevant higher education and placement. The social responsibilities of the students are also highlighted through appropriate programmes.

3. The Context

Some of the challenging issues encountered by the institution are - drop-out, absence from the class, unawareness about the importance of the higher education among the rural people and helping poor and needy people. Nandha Arts and Science College also plays a significant role in establishing linkages between the College and the School Sector on one hand and between the College and the Industry & Trade on the other. The students are motivated and trained to appear for national talent search examinations in Science and Sports. But the absence of the students during classes and examination is very challenging task for the college to tackle. The basic goal of the institution is to build the personality of the student and make them fit into the outside real world and face with self confidence to achieve our basic goal. They are divided into groups in each and every class to face their challenges as a team work. When the nation faces the problems of unemployment, under employable, competent and positive individuals in the job market. For this, the college has to organize grooming sessions for the local students but they benefit a little as the proverb is 'Old Habits die Hard'. Gradually the situation is improving.

The Institute has also got a vision of making a conducive atmosphere for the learningteaching process. It expects the individual teachers, non teaching staff and students to be self-motivated. For achieving this unique goal the institution believes strongly in 'transparency', 'rapport and 'understanding'. But the response of the parents has not been so positive because they considered their wards more as earning member than a learning member. Now the situation has begun to improve thanks to the incessant and untiring efforts of all the members of the institution.

4. The Practice

The college organizes Orientation programmes for all classes at the college level with an aim to provide clarity into each course being offered specially with the introduction of the credit based system of evaluation introduced by the University. It builds the confidence of the students regarding the course selected. It creates awareness among the students about the subject of their choice. It provides information to the students about the opportunities that would be available to them after completion of the course. It encourages the use of Information and Communications Technology (ICT) in Teaching Methods – Teachers will be provided with training for preparing ICT based lectures with the help of the faculties of Department of Computer Science and Information Technology. The teachers will be encouraged to use E-Resources within the syllabus. Students are participating in various seminars, workshops and symposium by our college, university and other institutions. Every class students are divided into four or five groups according to the strength of the class with a leader in each group. Every day and every group discuss among themselves recording there improvements in studies. The group leader gets information from the class in charges; HOD's regarding special classes, coaching classes and guest lecturers and conveys the matter to their group. This sort of team education system is very effective and is able to achieve good results. Regarding the Non-major elective course and EDC, the students are very eagerly participated. Extension activity is giving good opportunity to the students to mingle with the public. It is a path way to the students to understand the society.

5. Evidence of Success

The Academic Monitoring Committee in association with the Examination Committee and Concerned Head of the Departments, keep track of the exam result and overall performances of the students. The parents of the students are invited to share our views and suggest remedies. The students are provided counseling and their weak points are brought to their notice and thus proper development of the students in terms of their course programme and overall performance is ensured. The details of the students result are available with the examination cell of the college. The Academic Monitoring Committee of the College evaluates and monitors students' performances in the college. Their marks are taken for considerations and accordingly students are advised to make improvements. There is a substantial improvement approximately 60% (overall) in the performance of the students. University guidelines in this respect are strictly adhered to. The students have made some innovative contributions in terms of their projects and other small reports. One of the students of Science along with his group has come out with his original idea through short film and project in improving agriculture through organic farming and its importance in near future.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The problems are absence of the students, poor cooperation of the parents, poverty of the families, orthodoxical nature of the people in the surrounding, materialistic outlook of the people living in our place, ego problems and finally polluted environment of our area are some of the major problems encountered by the college during pursuing the practice. Most of the parents are working and the students are living in nuclear families. The earning of one member does not suffice to sustain the family. Therefore the students have to go for jobs at the cost of their studies. And it is very difficult for the college to dissuade them from doing so. It appears the parents are more interested in maintaining their livelihood than encouraging their wards to broaden their skills. The college is making all possible efforts to get over from this problem. In order to improve this situation, the college has decided to deploy teachers on Full Time basis to interact with the parents at their homesteads, but the college faces financial problems on this count as the college does not receive any financial assistance from the Government of Tamil Nadu. The college fulfils all its requirements through the scanty resources generated by the fees collected from the students which are too small in proportion to the larger goals set by the college. But the college is ever optimistic about achieving its future endeavours.

7. Notes (Optional) Best Practices of the Institution

Internal test

Each and every week, weekly test is conducted by the departments, to assess the student performance. This will help the students to prepare for the examination, without having huge burden.

* Various test Schemes

In our college we conducts internal test, mid semester examination, willing test, and model examination. Exam papers are valued by the staff members and Students progress is intimated to parents through post cards every month.

Weekly review meeting for the students

Weekly once review meeting conducted by the departments, to the team heads in that meeting students can represent their queries, problem faced by the students in understanding a particular concept, and they can represent their suggestion to improve the qualities of the staff members, on the basis of student point of view, and that meeting minutes is explained to staff members to rectify the suggestions given by the students.

* Concept of team

Our college framed the concept of team, in that we split the students in to various groups, to do their academic work like assignments, seminars, workshops, and represent their problem of the students while doing the study activities.

* Discipline

Our college staff and management, taken various efforts to create good students, on the basis of that, student movements watched by us and if any deviation arising in his activity, we take steps to bring him to the main stream.

Fees Concession

Fees concession given to weaker section of the district. This will help the people who are unable to do their higher studies, because of financial problems.

* Scholarship for the students

On the basis of applications given by the students, our college received various scholarships, from the Government for the welfare of the students.

***** Free seat for sports students

For the students those who performance well in sports activities in National, State, District level, free admission is given to continue their education.

* Seminars and Workshop

Students are enlightened by giving seminars, workshops, mini projects, institutional training, in plant training, and industrial visit etc.,

Placement Cell

We have active Training and Placement cell of our college, works round the clock, it conducted various ON and OFF Campus interview by various national and multinational companies. Offer letter was given to various selected students.

* Siruthuli

Siruthuli is the student association, formed to help the needy people in and around Erode District. This association runs by the students for the public.

Each and every week all the students of our college contribute Rupees one from their pocket money, that amount collectively spent for the needy people like orphanage, old age home, Blind School, mentally retorted persons, physically challenged persons etc., in around Erode District. Till now 2,50,000 rupees spent by us for this programme.

✤ Tree plantation

Each and every month, in around the college premises, we are planting 10 trees throughout the year, by all the departments of our college. This will help us to safeguard from global warming.






